Amors Centenary of Education Medalets for New South Wales

SHORT HISTORY OF SCHOOLS IN EARLY N.S.W.

No provision was made in the complements of the First Fleet for teaching facilities for the Colony of New South Wales. However, by 1779, Isabella Rosson a First Fleet convict, was conducting classes. She later married William Richardson of the New South Wales Corps. He, in turn, became the Colony's first male teacher.

In 1793 the Chaplain, the Rev. Richard Johnson erected a building at the corner of present Castlereagh and Hunter Streets for the Society for the propagation of the Gospel. This functioned as a school along with that of the Military Regiment.

In 1801 the Orphan School for Girls was opened, and in 1819 a similar establishment came into operation for boys. Both of these schools were Government financed. Until 1810 the money came from Dues and Customs, but in that year Governor Macquarie separated this into The Police Fund ¹ and The Orphan Fund. A silver, hand inscribed prize medal dated 1821 issued by the Male Orphan Institute has survived (Plate 1)².

Under Governor King the citizens of the Hawkesbury district were assisted in the erection of a two storey church and school. This was conducted by a "person of the Missionary Society who was sustained by food from the Government Store and a levy of 2d. an acre per year on the local farms".

By necessity tuition fees were often paid with produce. Thus, Thomas Pascoe Crook when advertising the re-opening of his boarding school at Paramatta in 1805 set the fees at "£30 per annum if paid in wheat or pork, £27 if paid in cash or approved bills".

The earliest Government financed school was not on the mainland. It was established on Norfolk Island in 1794. The funds were raised by Lieut. Governor King by a levy on Duties and Customs.

From 1819 the number of schools increased dramatically. The more important institutions included the Sydney Free Public Grammar School (1819), the Charity School House (1820), the Sydney Female School of Industry (1829), King's School Parramatta (1832) and the Sydney College (1835). At the same time there were many private schools which came and went. Their standards varied with the competence of their proprietors and many offered only to teach the social graces to what must have been very gauche colonial maidens.

In 1836 Governor Bourke proposed a National School system based on that of Ireland. The sum of £3,000 was allocated for buildings and stipends. These wages were to augment the "head money" of one half penny a day contributed by each pupil whose parents could afford it. Both

government and church schools received equal grants. Even so, in 1844 only half of the 26,000 children in the Colony between the ages of four and fourteen were having any education.

The year 1848 saw the setting up of two Education Boards; a National School Board and a Denominational School Board. The Military Hospital in Fort Street was converted into a Model School and opened in 1850. Two inspectors were appointed in 1850; one was responsible for the Port Phillip District the other for all East Coast settlements. In 1851 the entire system was reorganised under a Mr. Wilkins, who also set up a teacher training program.

The first Act of Parliament to consolidate an elementary system of education was passed in 1866 by Sir Henry Parkes. This abolished the two boards and set up the Council of Education. This body managed all schools receiving State Aid whether National or Denominational. All teachers had to be trained and a common

curriculum for all schools was instituted. In 1865 there were 1,067 private and public schools teaching 53,453 students; by 1875 this had risen to 2,542 schools teaching 127,756 pupils.

The beginning of full State Education in New South Wales is placed in 1880. In that year aid to Church Schools was repealed and responsibility for public education was accepted by the Colonial Government and the Department of Public Instruction was established. All employees of this Department became Public Servants. A uniform scale of fees of three pence per child or a shilling for four or more children from the one family was then instituted.

Thus around 1980 thirty-six of the States oldest places of learning celebrated the Centenary. Part of the celebrations included in many cases the production of a commemorative medal. Together these form a series to mark the occasion of "100 years of Education in NSW".
