MICHAEL MESZAROS, SCULPTOR AND MEDALLIST, FROM 1986 TO THE PRESENT

Michael Meszaros and Peter Lane

In 1986 the late Ray Jewell wrote an article on Michael Meszaros, one of Australia's leading modern medallists, for volume 2 of our Journal. Since that time Michael has continued to develop his career as an acknowledged sculptor and medallist.

The combination of medallic and larger work has continued but there has been a shift in the balance towards large monumental commissioned pieces, which reflects a significant shift in community attitudes towards public sculpture.

Michael has been kept so busy with commissioned work that he has not had a one man exhibition since 1986, although he has continued to produce medallions and sculpture for exhibition, mostly in group shows organised by the Association of Sculptors of Victoria. Michael has also shown many medallic works in the biennial Congress exhibitions of the International Medallists Federation (FIDEM), of which he continues to be the Australian delegate, and at the Dante Biennales in Ravenna, Italy, where he is the only artist in the world to have competed in every Biennale since its inception in 1973.

In the last few years, with the proliferation of public sculpture Michael has become increasingly concerned with the procedures used in the commissioning of work on a public or competitive basis. Michael has taken a leading role on behalf of the Association of Sculptors of Victoria and successfully corresponded with Jeff Kennett, the then Premier of Victoria, which resulted in a new set of Guidelines for Commissioning Public Art.

Artists were finding themselves increasingly dealing with anonymous bureaucratic

committees, working to conditions and processes drawn up by lawyers who have little understanding of the artistic process and the need for payment during the conception and design phase of a project. The insistence on competitive tendering in Victoria had required artists to submit unpaid designs for every project, leading to a situation where many good artists no longer expressed interest.

Michael's work has now been co-ordinated with a project which aims to have an Australia wide set of uniform conditions. The underlying principle is that artists must be paid when they are required to produce work. Bureaucracies continue to resist because they do not want to lose the opportunity of getting a free choice of designs. This aspect of his activity is consistent with his long held belief that an artist should be competent in business matters. Art schools mostly do not teach business practice and young artists are therefore severely disadvantaged. To counter this problem, he has written a 20,000 word guide to the business of living as a medallist for FIDEM which may be adapted to a more general form for use by artists of all disciplines.

Artistically he is still following the path he was on in 1986. With commissioned work he takes each client's problem, and tries to reach an educated understanding of the subject. He arrives at a philosophical conclusion as to what he thinks is of central importance to the subject, and then aims to produce a design which expresses, symbolises or illustrates that conclusion in some way.

There are some important implications in

this process. It is more analytical than some other artists' approaches and perhaps less emotional, but it gives a much better chance of being relevant to the client's purpose and therefore acceptable. It depends on having a range of stylistic and technical solutions at his disposal so that different ideas and situations can be accommodated. It relies on remaining outside artistic fads and fashions because it depends more on the strength of the idea than on any adherence to a current stylistic fashion. It depends on his understanding of his own thought processes rather than any conformity with current art theories or philosophies. The notion of following a school or artistic fashion seems to Michael a denial of the opportunity to be free in artistic terms. Similarly, slavishly sticking to one's own signature style seems to him. a crippling of an artist's own freedom, for commercial purposes or an expression of a poverty of inspiration.

One of the benefits of commissioned work is that it forces him to think hard about subjects which in many cases would never otherwise be brought to his attention. It becomes Michael's job to be interested in the subject and to have thoughts, feelings and responses to it. It forces him in many cases to look for new ways of expressing ideas, and sometimes new techniques, to achieve these expressions.

Some of his personal medallion work has become more simplified using lines and planes. He has become more willing to play with the circle itself, cutting out or adding on, and using irregular edges. He believes that for a work to remain a medallion, the circle must be kept, if not in full, at least in overall form or by the fact of the original circle being deformed. In some cases the idea of the circle may be emphasised by its being damaged or tampered with. Michael likes to look for subjects which by their nature have

a circular element or which can be worked into a circle from a particular point of view.

Michael sees the most important point as always keeping his eyes and mind open to possibilities, both for personal and commissioned work. Indeed, he believes that commissioned work should be approached on the basis that the only difference between it and personal work should be that the client nominates the subject. While this may not always be the case, the notions that a commissioned work must convey something centrally relevant about the client's subject and that a personal work must convey something worthwhile about a perception of the artist brings the two processes very close together.

Michael firmly believes "that the quality of an idea and the effectiveness or efficiency of its communication are central to the making of art. Ideas come from perceptions of experience which we all have in our own ways. The artist is the one who can produce an object or image, which tells the viewer about that perception. The recognised 'masterpieces' in art history all share the characteristics of a great idea coming from an incisive perception, communicated in an exceptionally effective manner. The means may be complicated or simple, but in general, the simpler the solution the harder it gets. In short, complexity or obscurity is often the refuge of the incompetent. The simple solution often indicates that the artist has understood the essentials of the subject and has stuck to them in the solution. However, it is most important to allow that sometimes complexity is part of the solution and that there are no absolute rules in art. As soon as we make them, somebody successfully breaks them "


Distant Conversations 1992


Telstra Headquarters, cnr. Exhibition & Lonsdale Streets, Melbourne cast bronze, fabricated copper and stainless steel, tapestry, 3 sculpture sections, 2 tapestries.

Figures life size, interior sculptures 6m and 3m tall, tapestries 4x4.5m. Telstra's function is to span distance using technology. The groups of faces show people communicating face to face. The stainless steel grid of technology allows each person or group to span the distances between them. The tapestries extend the sculpture and the figures on the footpath encourage passers by to look at the whole work. The volume of the foyer becomes part of the piece.

COMMISSIONED MEDALLIONS



Footscray Ammunition Factory Centenary 1988

Cast 189mm bronze, struck 63mm tombac & 40mm cupronickel. At the time, all munitions made at Footscray were for the defence of Australia. A flower garden in the shape of Australia is surrounded by a sea of munitions protecting it.



Ray Jewell Memorial Award 1998

Struck, tombac and silver, 63mm.

Ray Jewell was great coin collector in the true sense of collecting pieces for the history they represent. Here a holey dollar is swung aside to reveal a scene of old Sydney.



Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute Medallion 1994

Struck, tombac, 63mm

Victor Chang was Australia's leading heart transplant surgeon. The dead donor is in outline, the live recipient in full. The heart is shared.



Telstra Retirement Award 1987

Struck, tombac 63mm

Telstra's function is to link individuals over distance. Two sets of five faces are linked by five lines over a wider background network. The individual's contribution is the two hands nurturing that function.



Tasman Institute. Tasman Medal 1994Cast bronze 150mm

Awarded to an economic innovator. Economic indicator graphs float on a stormy sea. Abel Tasman's ship cuts a wake through the storm and through the indicators.



Montefiore Homes. Outstanding Personal Service Award 1994

Cast bronze 150mm

Voluntary service comes from a combination of a conscious decision, an emotional response and in the case of the Jewish community, a long tradition of community service.



LaTrobe University. Psychology Honours Prize 1994

Cast bronze 150mm

Each personality is formed by a mass of overlapping influences.

An individual's face materialises out of sections of different flow lines.



The Australian Society of Rheology Medallion 1991

Cast bronze 150mm

Rheology is the study of fluid flow. An clastic fluid flows out of a controlling value, into a guiding pair of hands, finds its level and spills over the edge of the medallion.



The SmithKline Beecham Research Award 1986

Cast bronze 150mm

Awarded for research into infectious diseases. The hand holds a magnifying glass concentrating on the leading edge of an infection spreading across a population.



Australian Society for Parasitology. Sprent Award 1987

Cast bronze 150mm diam.

A successful parasite generally damages the function of the host without killing it. Dots in various positions on a cross section of an imaginary organism deform the normal lines of different organs. Sprent's portrait is superimposed.

Struggle with Disability

An out of proportion figure struggles to escape from a constricting veil, pushing the limitations imposed by the veil.




Family

The child is dependent on the affection of its parents. A single thickness of bronze is bent and folded to produce a couple about to kiss with the child between.

Cry
A baby cries with all its might. The mouth occupies the bulk of the medallion.

Gossip
Gossip goes around from mouth to ear, mouth to ear. The circular nature of gossip is reflected in the shape of the medallion.


The Hat
An elegant woman's hat with a veil partly obscuring the face. The hat uses the form of the medallion, the broad forms contrasting with the details of face and veil.

Global Warming A hand holds the melting world, oozing through the fingers. The world began as a circle, but has deformed and the hand now holds the world together.

Caterpillar

The curved leaf forms the circle and the caterpillar is eating it away. 114mm. 1999 bronze cast



Migration

A v-shaped flight of swans passes over a full moon in silhouette. Projecting beyond the circle and causing the moon to float in its surroundings.

The Gospel According to the Medal

A medallists' in-joke. The book is a circle cast in bronze as a medallion, suggesting some kind of medallic propaganda.

Mouse Munched Medal

A mouse has eaten most of the medallion. Has its origin in a series of medallions called medallic mishaps - things that can go wrong for a circle.

Decolletage

A woman with a low cut dress displaying her charms is constructed entirely out of sections of circles and planes. Her pendant repeats the medallion in miniature.

A three level overpass enters and leaves the circle with the ramps giving the effect of Celtic calligraphy.


